UT Center for Industrial Services to Hold Business Retention & Expansion Course

Implementing a business retention and expansion program is an essential component to any community's economic development strategy and is essential to future economic growth. In an effort to inform community leaders on how to help Tennessee businesses survive and grow in these tough economic times, the University of Tennessee Center for Industrial Services (CIS) will be hosting the 2011 Tennessee Business Retention and Expansion Course November 16-17 in Jackson.

This course examines how to plan, implement and measure the performance of an effective retention and expansion program through in-class lecture, panel discussions, and work group assignments. This course examines how to promote existing businesses and address sudden and unexpected losses of major employers. This course also looks into the importance of retooling both the workplace and workforce as an important part of a successful community's retention and expansion program.

Those who would benefit from this course include: chamber of commerce and economic and community development organization professionals, elected officials, government agency staff, community planners, utility personnel, business leaders, real estate brokers and developers, community volunteers, and anyone interested in promoting a healthy and vibrant local economy.

The one-and-a-half day course will be held at the University of Tennessee's West Tennessee Research and Education Center. The program will begin the afternoon of Wednesday, November 16 and will end Thursday evening.

Registration deadline is November 11th. The course fee is \$250, which includes course materials, instruction, selected meals and refreshment breaks. Registration is limited to 40 participants and will be filled on a first-come, first-served basis. A block of rooms has been reserved for course participants at the Doubletree Hotel in Jackson at a special course rate of \$77 nightly plus tax. Course participants should make their own room reservations by November 4, 2011, to receive the discounted rate. Sample Interlocal Agreement for Planning Assistance

With the termination of the state's Office of Local Planning, many local governments in Tennessee are seeking a new arrangement to fulfill their planning needs. One such arrangement, already in place in a number of jurisdictions, is an interlocal agreement whereby a local government with a planning department provides planning services to another local government on a contractual basis. As drafted, the sample interlocal agreement assumes a city with a planning department providing planning services to a county. However, the agreement can be tailored to fit an arrangement between any political subdivisions, city or county. Tennessee Public Service Intern Program

Local government internships are available through a partnership of the University of Tennessee Institute for Public Service (IPS) with faculty at the Knoxville campus, the Chattanooga campus, East Tennessee State University, Middle Tennessee State University, Tennessee State University and the University of Memphis.

The intern experience develops the next generation of local government leaders with exposure of students to service to communities. It also provides a venue of support to local governments in Tennessee from the academic and research resources of the universities

The internships are offered at undergraduate, graduate, and postgraduate levels and include duties ranging from research analysis; working with field consultants, statewide associations or cities and counties for specific experience; assisting the chief administrative officer; and rotating through duties to gain extensive experience in all aspect of city or county management.

Program interns are currently serving Tennessee counties in the following offices: the Rutherford County Circuit Court Clerk's office, the Shelby County Probate Court Clerk's office, and the Sullivan County Clerk's office.
