TCSA Plans to Recognize County Success Stories

At this year's Fall Conference and Trade Show, the Tennessee County Services Association (TCSA) plans to recognize counties who have demonstrated excellence in governance, innovation in problem solving and best practices for delivering services. The new awards will be presented at the fall conference at the same time as the Robert Wormsley Award for Outstanding County Official of the Year. While the Wormsley Award honors an individual county official who has shown great dedication to public service, the awards for County Success Stories are aimed at recognizing projects or milestones that counties have accomplished.

"I've always felt we should be doing more to recognize and highlight the great things Tennessee counties are doing," said Director David Connor. "I hear many stories of county officials finding innovative ways of solving common problems or showing great leadership in turning around struggling programs. As an association, we should be telling these stories to promote best practices, inspire innovation and help other counties know about solutions that their peers have found."

To be considered for a County Success Story award, the project or achievement should demonstrate an innovative solution to a problem, a sustained pattern of excellence in governance, a best practice that increased efficiency in the delivery county services or resulted in significant savings to taxpayers, a new approach or the use of new technology to deliver services or improved cooperation or coordination between county offices or local governments that resulted in enhanced delivery of services.

QECB Program Second Request for Proposals Available

\$39 Million Available for Qualifying Projects

The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) recently announced a second Request for Proposals (RFP) for its Qualified Energy Conservation Bond (QECB) Program. The QECB Program was created in 2008 to provide low-interest financing to local governments for energy savings projects. Types of projects that may qualify for a bond include (but are not limited to): capital projects for reducing energy consumption, implementing green community programs, rural development involving renewable electricity resources, mass commuting, research grants, and public education campaigns.

Approximately \$39 million is available for this second request for proposals. All local

jurisdictions in Tennessee are eligible to participate in the program.

Proposals are due by **August 1, 2014.** The RFP is available from TDEC's website here: http://www.tennessee.gov/environment/energy-qualified-energy-conservation-bond.shtml.
